Our Minister

Emmanuel – the oft forgotten and unwrapped gift



It is sometimes hard to remember, and very easy to forget, amongst all the shopping lists, the present wrapping, the food preparation and the over-eating, what a monumental event Christmas actually is. Christmas is 'Emmanuel - God with us'. When we forget that, well Christmas just becomes an odd, overpriced and weirdly displaced reason to indulge in maudlin sentimentality. (Has anyone ever watched the Christmas channel?)

But to Christians Christmas is a time when we remember the immensity of God entering into the littleness of human history. And why did God do that not to critique us, not to audit our moral accounts, but to simply be <u>with us?</u> And God did this in such a counter intuitive way. In other words, he didn't do it like a god, at least not the way we think gods should act when we think of gods. The Son of God was born into a little town, among a little people, in a little nation that was of little importance especially by comparison with the great powers of the day. Now <u>why</u> did he do that?

Some people think that when God 'became a human being and lived amongst us' JOHN 1:14 it was simply part of an emergency plan to tidy up and forgive our sins. But the Christmas gospel tells us that God did all this to be with us. Even more than that, he did it to release us all into becoming what we all were always made to be. Left to ourselves we humans so easily fall into the habit of living small, shrunken, short-term lives. But the "repair", (or salvation to gives its theological name), involved God coming in human flesh to live among us and to repair not just our relation to him but also our relation to ourselves. Jesus described his mission among us this way.

'I have come that you might have life and have in abundance'. IOHN 10

The gift of God to us at Christmas is not more stuff (or stuffing) but a gift that would allow you and I to have 'life and life more abundant'. And this gift is wrapped up in a baby, born of Mary, whose name was Emmanuel, which means God with us!

I do hope you all have a wonderful time this Christmas unwrapping that gift. Peace, Tony.

I was looking for a November poem and Walter de la Mare from school days popped up. I was looking for praise of autumn colours but will have to stick to my own. I thought the colours this year were stunning. There was colour at night too I believe as I read many reports of the aurora borealis early in the month. I stepped out one bright night, but it looked more like the "simmer dim".


November is usually a "transitional month". There was a swift change this year. 58F/14.4C on the 6th equalled my highest November temperature set on the 3rd in 2005. Just 15 days later I recorded 19.9F/-7C – the second coldest November minimum recorded. That was on the 24th in 1993.

Late news: October's rainfall was 3.53in/89.7mm. It was the 4th wettest month of 2025, but it was still 1.31 inches below average. Baddinsgill Reservoir has been very low.

There are no prizes for guessing that November has already been wetter than average. The first four days were wetter than the whole of April. The 13th was the wettest day since the thunderstorm of 21st July. On the 24th, we passed 6 inches so far for the first time since May last year.

Once again, we are experiencing extremes and already we have had snow drifts lying on the Pentland Hills for eight days. What lies ahead I wonder?

Old Chestnuts

I have a fondness for sweet chestnuts. The first time I had them I was about 8 or 9 and we had made the long trip from Co Tyrone to Suffolk, via road and sea, to visit my aunt and uncle and my 'English cousins', as I thought of them.

They had a walnut tree in the garden in Great Barton, and this seemed so exotic to me. Imagine how I felt about the chestnuts which were, as the song says, roasted on an open fire!

Since then, I've had roasted chestnuts wherever I've had the joy of finding them – Berlin, London, Edinburgh and most memorably on the beautiful Atlantic island of Madeira. There you follow the winding roads firstly up, up, up through the hills and then down through the chestnut trees to the town of Curral das Freiras (the Nuns' Valley). There they hold an annual festival for the loveliest of all the nuts and use them to prepare many delicious dishes.

These festivals happen in other places in Europe too, notably in Italy. Can we ever thank the Italians enough for inventing Marron Glacé??

So, when I see chestnuts appear in the shops in late October/November I always buy some! But, sad to say, this year I was waiting for the perfect moment to roast them and the moment passed, I hung on to them for too long. I thought 'I'll give it a try anyway' and so I scored them and into the oven they went. When I came to peel them, the insides were shrivelled stones and some were mouldy – alas for them, and for me.

I'll get some more (maybe Santa will supply some of the extra special plump ones I saw in Valvona & Crolla?) and I'll make time to enjoy them.


The lesson of course is don't save your chestnuts - an old chestnut is only going to crack your teeth. And so, we can carry this message into all areas of life.


